*The Newest member of the Western Music Hall of Fame, Cowboys and Indians Magazine has called **Dave Stamey** “the Charley Russell of Western Music.” Western Horseman Magazine has declared his “Vaquero Song” to be one of the greatest Western songs of all time. In 2010, 2011 and 2013 True West Magazine named him Best Living Western Solo Musician. Dave Stamey has been a cowboy, a mule packer, a dude wrangler, and is now one of the most popular Western entertainers working today. He has been voted Seven times Entertainer of the Year, Seven times Male Performer of the Year and*

Five times Songwriter of the Year by the Western Music Association, and received the Will Rogers Award from the Academy of Western Artists. He’s delighted audiences in twenty three states, and finds that he prefers this to being stomped by angry horses.



SaddleStrings is a cowboy band based in Hooper, UT. Kurt (Snoose) & Cindy Argyle, Laurie Morgan, and Brian Arnold make up the group, and for over 20 years, they’ve portrayed their life’s experiences through music. From the ranch & rodeo arena to the summer range, hay fields, and mountain trails, they’ve been there, done that, and love to share this with audiences using instruments, harmony, and humor. The group is as much at home singing around a campfire as they are on stage. The SaddleStrings have recorded 6 albums as a group, and Brian has a solo album.



Jo Lynne Kirkwood is descended from original Utah Pioneer ancestors, who all farmed and ranched in the valleys of Utah and northern Arizona. She and her husband Michael now farm in Sevier County. Jo Lynne is a well-known storyteller and cowboy poet, and her tales reflect the values and lifestyle of rural Utah. *Jo is a Lariat Laureate on Cowboy Poetry.com, and has been named Female poet of the Year by the Academy of Western Artists. Her poetry has received numerous other awards and has been published in magazines, anthologies, and elsewhere.* In

addition to her other awards she has been honored at the Ogden Pioneer Days celebration. She was nominated by her county not only because of her contributions to life in Sevier County communities, but also because of the reminders of Utah heritage that she shares as she travels to other locations with her performances. Her poems are sometimes humorous, sometimes sad, and sometimes almost prayerful. Jo Lynne's words are especially mindful of the role of women in ranching and rural life. She is the mother of four children, and has two small grandsons.
